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Heroine Joan of Arc once cautioned, "To sacrifice what you are and to live without belief, that is a fate more terrible than dying." Tragically, this daring woman really did sacrifice herself to prove that she would stand by her beliefs, even if it meant death. By the end of Shakespeare's tragedy, Juliet would also rather die than be unfaithful to her beloved, but it takes a fiery romance for her to undergo the change. Out of the many characters in *Romeo and Juliet*, Juliet's disposition evolved the most, maturing her into a valiant, audacious woman.

At first, Juliet is submissive to her parent's desires, but that diffident, obedient girl

vanishes as soon as she becomes infatuated with Romeo. For instance, when Juliet's mother

urges her to marry Paris, she replies with, "I'll look to like if looking liking move. / But no more

Adeep will I endart mine eye / Than your consent gives strength to make it fly" (1.3.99-101). The strength to make it fly (1.3.99-101). The strength to make

of ignorance, for she has not experienced true love. Contrastingly, Juliet is forthright when she

declares her true intentions to her mom after developing sentimental feelings for Romeo. "I will

not marry yet, and when I do, I swear / It shall be Romeo, whom you know I hate, / Rather than

Paris" (3.5.121-123). Defying her mother without a hint of misgiving was the pivotal point in

Juliet's transformation into a resolute woman; from then on, Juliet would let no one impede her objectives. Before her passionate feelings for Romeo, this certitude was not inherent in Juliet

because he was her impetus to transgress against her parents' domineering authority.

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Conceivably, Romeo's banishment inspired Juliet to adamantly stand up for her beliefs, regardless of the repercussions.

Additionally, Juliet gains a sense of spontaneity and audacity that was previously non-existant before Romeo's exile. For example, in their first secret visit while Romeo is proclaiming his love for her, Juliet cuts him short: I have no joy of this contract tonight. / It is too & rash, too unadvised, too sudden" (2.2.124-125). Juliet's heart has boundless love for him, but her mind is reflecting on her duty as daughter of the Capulets, creating ambivalence that contributes to her tentative reply. She is not yet self-confident; therefore, she disregards her heart and warily proceeds the conversation with prudence. However, Juliet drastically transforms after Romeo's exile, going so far as to deceive the Nurse and hastily consult the Friar for desperate solutions to her predicament with Paris. "Hide me with a dead man in his shroud--- / Things that, to hear them told, have made me / tremble— / And I will do it without fear or doubt" (4.1.87-90). Recklessly going behind her parents' backs proves that no matter what, Juliet will no longer comply with their wishes because her loyalty now lies with Romeo; as a result, she valiantly commits suicide of her own accord, something she probably never fathomed before her romantic escapade. By now, Juliet is sick of being docile and will do anything rash to stall the wedding with Paris, empowering her to carry out her own impulsive decisions with assertion. In a mere four days, Juliet had to cope with intense love and despondent heartbreak; perhaps, the radical changes brought about radical reform to her morals, allowing a matured woman to emerge. Juliet was transformed into a dauntless, self-reliant woman, as a result of the heartache she endured. Inequitable events often push people to their limit, driving them to think differently than how they previously did in order to get out of their crisis. When a kid is incessantly bullied, eventually that kid will grow tired of being discontented and retaliate; in the same way, after days of obliging her parents, a reticent girl will feel impelled to finally get her way. Although each case involved two unalike victims, in the end both gained a dynamic quality formerly absent: audacity.
